Florida Tops List Of Foreclosures In January

According to RealtyTrac, the California-based housing research firm, Florida was number one on the Top 10 list of states for foreclosure in January 2015.

Foreclosure filings increased 5 percent from December 2014 to January 2015 but were down 4 percent compared with a year ago. RealtyTrac reported that 119,888 U.S. properties — 1 in every 1,102 housing units — had foreclosure filings in January.

Florida was followed by Nevada, Maryland, Illinois, New Jersey, California, Arizona, Ohio, Delaware and Washington respectively.
